





2020 WYOMING COMMUNITY IMPACT







Even with the unique challenges caused by COVID-19, we continued to share our energy with the communities we serve through charitable giving, outreach and employee volunteerism.



Serving almost 179,000 natural gas and electric utility customers in 56 communities, our direct economic impact in Wyoming included charitable giving, compensation to over 430 Wyoming employees, payments to suppliers and property, sales and use taxes paid.
